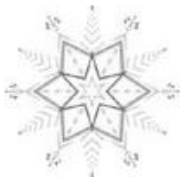

Grant News

Lansing Public library is pleased to announce that we have been awarded a \$12,500 state grant to improve accessibility by the handicapped. A requirement of the grant is that funding is matched by the library. The Friends of Lansing Library has graciously approved about \$8000 for the project! Thank you Friends!

Funds will be used to install **automated push-button doors** making it easier for the handicapped and elderly to enter and exit the building.

Funds will also be used to provide greater accessibility in the Adult Circulation and Reference Departments. The Adult Circulation Desk will be replaced, and the Reference Desk will be remodeled to include a lower accessible section.

Work on these projects will begin this spring, and we appreciate your understanding and cooperation as we make these improvements to serve our patrons better!

This is the third grant the library has received this year from the State Library.
