Although they believe the tiny atoll to be uninhabited, it is actually home to a mysterious woman who has been stranded on the remote strip of land for more than forty years.

Ruins by Kevin J. Anderson [SiFi/AND]

A well-connected American archaeologist, Cassandra Tubicon, disappears while exploring the lost Mayan city of Xitaclan and an FBI team is flown to the Yucatan jungles to investigate.

Dead Morn by Piers Anthony & Roberto Fuentes**[SiFi/ANT]**

In the 25th century, survivors of the nuclear war must live underground. Their actions must be regulated and their passions must be controlled. When a man dares to take a lover of his own choice, he must be punished. The only way to alter this grim future is to journey back to the past.

Time Scout by Robert Asprin & Linda Evans**[SiFi/ASP]**

Kenneth “Kit” Carson was one of the best, if not the best, time scouts in the business. But he has collected more than a few scars, both physical and mental, while poking around back in time and trying not to draw the attention of the natives, not always successfully.

Wages of Sin by Robert Asprin & Linda Evans**[SiFi/ASP]**

In the early part of the 21st Century disaster struck – an experiment on an orbiting station went wrong. The Accident almost destroyed the universe and ripples in time washing over the Earth. Like the plagues of an earlier millennium, Earth was depopulated and then it rebuilt. The people of the post disaster world learned that things were going to be a little different.

Wings of Refuge by Lynn Austin**[F/AUS]**

At forty-two, Abigail MacLeod is about to realize a lifelong dream – participation in an archaeological dig in Israel. Crushed by her husband’s decision to end their marriage, Abby clings to the hope that somehow this trip will help to bring an element of peace into her chaotic life. But when tragedy taints the summer’s promise, Abby questions the wisdom of staying on.

In the Garden of Iden by Kage Baker **[SiFi/BAK]**

Mendoza is not thrilled about being sent to Renaissance England. It's a cold, backward, unsafe country and the food is crawling with bacteria. No flush toilets. She won't get to see Shakespeare either. He hasn't been born yet. The English hate the Spanish like smallpox, especially now with bulldog-faced Mary on the throne. Mendoza is no longer a frightened little girl in the dungeons of the Inquisition; she's a Company trained botanist and has an assignment to save *Ilex Tormentosum*'s species of holly that will go extinct in a hundred years.

The Graveyard Game by Kage Baker **[SiFi/BAK]**

You wouldn't take Lewis for an immortal cyborg: he looks like a dapper character from a Noel Coward play. And Joseph is short and stocky in his Armani suit, with a neatly trimmed black mustache and beard that gives him a cheerfully villainous look. What are these two operatives of the Company doing in an amusement arcade in San Francisco in 1996?

Mendoza in Hollywood by Kage Baker **[SiFi/BAK]**

At a stagecoach inn on the road to Los Angeles, botanist Mendoza meets her fellow cyborgs. Porfirio, the security tech, has broken the rules by maintaining contact with his mortal family. Mendoza is being haunted in her dreams by the man she loved and lost three centuries ago. Then his ghost is unexpectedly reincarnated with the arrival of a very large, very smooth and very handsome British spy, Edward Alton Bell-Fairfax.

Sky Coyote by Kage Baker **[SiFi/BAR]**

The year is 1699, the place the Lost City in the heart of the Mayan jungle but in fact it's New World One, a rest-and-rec center for Dr. Zeus's hard working immortal operatives.

The Christmas Train by David Baldacci**[F/BAL]**

Disillusioned journalist Tom Langdon must get from Washington to L.A. in time for Christmas. Forced to take the train across the country because of a slight “misunderstanding” at airport security, he begins a journey of self-discovery and rude awakenings, mysterious goings-on and thrilling adventures, screwball escapades and holiday magic.

Finity by John Barnes**[SiFi/BAR]**

Lyle Peripart’s world is coming apart. Up until just a few days ago he was a settled professor at the University of Auckland. The descendant of American expatriates, he’s proud of his ancestry and privately doesn’t care for the Reichs that have dominated the world since the Axis victory over a century ago. But he’s the quiet type, not looking for a fight.

Cross Channel by Julian Barnes**[F/BAR]**

These ten stories, singly and as a whole, examine the strange and persistent attraction between these two countries, as well as the often-ambiguous results. The collection spans the channel from the late seventeenth century, when mercenary soldiers attempt to “convert” a Protestant village in southern France, to the year 2015, when an aging Londoner travels yet again to Paris, carrying a lifetime of memories with him on the now antiquated Eurostar train.

Familiar Acts by June Barraclough**[F/BAR]**

The Coppen household seems like that of any other in Victorian England’s “polite society” – on the surface. Through the eyes and curious mind of young Hetty Coppen, though, the reader is taken behind the tactful arrangements that comprise the Coppens’ façade and left to wonder at the unspoken truths and mysterious connections that could this winsome heroine’s childhood.

Boondocking by Tricia Bauer**[F/BAU]**

Sylvia and Clayton Vaeth, nearing retirement age, abandon life in the working class Maryland suburbs yet drag all the paraphernalia and complexities of domestic life behind them in a travel trailer. They take to the road with their grandchild Rita to protect her from a pursuing son-in-law, Melvin, Rita's father, who in a drug induced accident was responsible for the death of their only daughter, Janice.

Henderson, the Rain King by Saul Bellow**[F/BEL]**

Bellow evokes all the rich color and exotic customs of a highly imaginary Africa in this comic novel about a middle age American millionaire who, seeking a new, more rewarding life, descends upon an African tribe.

Looking For a Hero by Patti Berg**[F/BER]**

Morgan "Black Heart" Farrell can't believe that the honey haired siren is telling him the truth: that he's sailed right into the twentieth century. He desperately needs to get back to his ship and his own time. But for now, the widowed Kate seems to need a man who can protect and comfort her. Black Heart knows he may have brought danger with him from the past, but he can't seem to resist Kate's cupid-bow mouth with its fiery kisses.

Beneath the Wind by Cordelia Frances Biddle**[F/BID]**

Tragedy had no place in Eugenia's life. As the wife of the youngest son of Philadelphia's wealthiest family, she had been granted everything any young woman could desire. Her husband was devoted, her children adoring, her life one of ease and comfort. There was orderliness to her days that by its very nature seemed to deny tragedy's existence.

The Queen's Man by Terri Brisbin**[F/BRI]**

Textiles expert Sharon Reynolds is examining a treasure trove of Elizabethan clothing when she discovers a bit of parchment containing an astounding piece of information. But before she has a chance to share the find with her colleagues, she stumbles through a hidden door to another time.

Two in the Field by Darryl Brock [F/BRO]

In the sequel to *If I Never Get Back*, Samuel Clemens Fowler yearns to return to 1869 Ohio, where he had fallen in love with a beautiful Irish widow and gets his wish when he is transported back through time to 1875, where he becomes caught up in the tumultuous events of the era.

Hotel du Lac by Anita Brookner [F/BRO]

Edith Hope is in disgrace. A successful novelist, mature and capable, she has made a fool of herself over love. Her horrified friends have packed her off to a proper Swiss hotel to come to her senses, but the Hotel du Lac proves no refuge from love or folly.

Riding Shotgun by Rita Mae Brown [M/BRO]

For Pryor Deyhle Blackwood, nothing can cloud the excitement of tomorrow's hunt. Not the first anniversary of her husband's death, not even the pain of Blackie's legendary infidelities. Dizzied by the demands of single motherhood and her flaky real estate clients, Cig feels truly alive only when she's flying over a jump on her favorite horse.

Turnip Blues by Helen Campbell [LP/F/CAM][F/CAM]

As long as I've known she's listened to Bessie Smith. The music makes her dangerous. She knocks down the table lamps and drink coasters and Hummel figurines, then warbles along, top volume, as if the voice on the phonograph isn't noise enough, now she's got this cockamamie idea about visiting Bessie's grave.

Enchantment by Orson Scott Card [FANT/CAR]

The moment Ivan stumbled upon a clearing in the dense Carpathian forest, his life was forever changed. Atop a pedestal encircled by fallen leaves, the beautiful princess Katerina lay as still as death. But beneath the foliage a malevolent presence stirred and sent the ten-year-old Ivan scrambling for the safety of Cousin Marek's farm.

Pastwatch by Orson Scott Card**[SiFi/CAR]**

A small group of scientists and historians, carefully trained, spend their days viewing the human past through a machine, the TruSitell. It takes a particular talent to search the past for moments of significance, to focus the machines and track individuals through the depths of time. But a woman named Tagiri is more than just talented, she has a knack for finding interesting lives.

Veronica by Nicholas Christopher**[F/CHR]**

On a snowy night in February, at the improbable point in lower Manhattan where Waverly Place intersects Waverly Place, Leo meets Veronica for the first time. Starkly beautiful, mysterious, aloof, she leads him into a world where illusion blends seamlessly with reality – a luminously transformed city where powerful underground streams crisscross beneath the streets, a city of dragon points and Tibetan mysticism, where real time is magically altered.

Signals of Distress by Jim Crace**[F/CRA]**

The author tells the story of an American emigration vessel grounded off the coast of England in the 1830's. While The Belle of Wilmington waits to be refloated, the isolated community of Wherrytown offers what hospitality it can to the crew. But the Americans prove a disturbing presence, not least Otto, the ship's slave cook.

Fallen Heroes by Dafydd ab Hugh**[SiFi/DAF]**

When a troop of alien warriors demands the return of an imprisoned comrade, a prisoner no one on Deep Space Nine knows anything about, Commander Benjamin Sisko has a deadly fight on his hands. Under sudden attack from the heavily armed warriors, Sisko and his crew struggle desperately to repel the invaders and save the lives of everyone on board.

Nowhere to Run by Robert Daley

[LP/F/DAL][F/DAL]

NYPD detective Jack Dilger is drifting way out of his jurisdiction. He suspects a society art dealer is fencing stolen old masters to Colombian drug traffickers and starts to follow their trail. Then suddenly, he's ordered off the case. He defies his superiors and finds himself risking his marriage, his career and his life.

Holy Terror in the Hebrides by Jeanne M. Dams

[M/DAM]

Dorothy Martin has a weakness for fine food and when her friends Tom and Lynn invite her to spend some time with them at a cottage on the island of Iona in the Hebrides, promising fresh crab and exquisite salmon, and since her friend Chief constable Alan Nesbitt is away in Brussels, she gives in and agrees to join them. The first thing that goes wrong is Tom's chest pain, keeping the Andersons in London. The second thing that troubles Dorothy is the folk traveling with her, an ecumenical group from Chicago that is anything but ecumenical. The third problem is the weather forecast. A storm is bearing down on the island that makes them think twice.

Breath, Eyes, Memory by Edwidge Danticat

[LP/F/DAN][F/DAN]

At the age of twelve, Sophie Caco is sent from her impoverished village of Croix-des-Rosets to New York, to be reunited with a mother she barely remembers. There she discovers secrets that no child should ever know and a legacy of shame that can be healed only when she returns to Haiti – to the women who first reared her. What ensues is a passionate journey through a landscape charged with the supernatural and scarred by political violence.

Song of the Exile Kiana Davenport

[F/DAV]

The author draws upon the remarkable stories of her people to create a passionate tale of love and survival and follows the fortunes of the Meahuna family and the odyssey of one resilient man searching for his soul mate after she is torn from his side by the forces of war.

Killed in the fog by William L. De Andrea

[M/DEA]

Matt Cobb's job as vice president of special projects is a strange one. All of the networks' problems end up on his desk. Over the past few years, these problems have included everything from dealing with murder and mayhem to making sure that the right person is picked up at the right time by the right car. After years of dealing with this, he has had it. He's decided to call it quits. Unfortunately, Tom Falzer, president of the network, simply can't allow one of his key associates to leave. Matt is convinced to take an extended leave of absence.

Legend by Jude Deveraux

Petite Kady Long, a celebrated chef about to be married to a gorgeous man, felt she was the luckiest woman alive. But, when she opened an antique flour tin and discovered a charming old photo of four strangers, she felt a mysterious empathy and an irresistible desire to try on the delicate satin wedding dress, amethyst earrings, and gossamer veil that were tucked inside. Stranger still was the dizzy spell that came over her.

The Priest by Thomas M. Disch

[F/DIS]

Father Patrick Bryce, a Catholic priest with a present day Minneapolis parish and a pedophile past. He's spent time at a church run retreat for priests of her persuasion and returned 'rehabilitated'; even better equipped to keep his vice active and hidden – until the blackmail begins. It comes from three different sources (his own bishop being one), and each tops the next in imaginative proposals: Father Pat must head a militant anti-abortion campaign and apologize to each of his victims, face-to-face and he must read and be ready to discuss the work of a bizarre cult science fiction writer and get the face of Satan tattooed on his chest.

Orange Crush by Tim Dorsey

Republican Marlon Conrad decides to travel via a campaign bus emblazoned with the vibrant "Orange Crush" logo after suffering from a traumatic event, while his opponent Gomer Tatum challenges him to a WWF death match.

The Prince Lost to Time by Ann Dukthas [M/DUK]

In this book the sleuth uncovers the mysterious fate of the lost dauphin, Louis Charles, the young son Queen Marie Antoinette left behind when she was forced to mount the scaffold in 1793.

In the Time of the Poisoned Queen by Ann Dukthas [M/DUK]

In England, 1558 was a year of sinister and bloody conspiracy. Queen Mary, deserted by her husband, Philip of Spain, faces an ever-tightening circle of conspiracy and deceit. Rumors and whispers abound that some subtle poison is slowly murdering her, like her first minister Reginald Cardinal Pole.

Days of Cain by J.R. Dunn [F/DUN]

What would you do with the opportunity to alter the past? Would you use the power to eradicate the greatest evil in the annals of humankind, even if it meant destroying the continuity of history? Is the future worth the sacrifice of millions of lives?

Wanderlust by Chris Dyer [F/DYE]

Taking a job writing a low-budget travel column for a New York newspaper, Kate Bogart soon discovers that her dream job has some drawbacks, including a hectic schedule, not-so-exotic destinations and uppity British journalist Miles Maxwell.

The Trespass by Barbara Ewing [F/EWI]

London 1849; the capital city is living in fear. Cholera is everywhere. Eminent MP Sir Charles Cooper decides it is too risky for his younger daughter, the strangely beautiful and troubled Harriet and sends her to the countryside. When Harriet does come home, London has become more dangerous than ever. Her health, freedom, even her sanity are under threat. Escape is essential. Can a young powerless girl change her life? Can she board the Amaryllis without being discovered? Does she realize that if she flees, more than one person will pursue her, literally to the end of the world?

The Animal's Waltz by Cary Fagan [F/FAG]

Shella Hersh is spending her early thirties leading a double life. She hangs out at the cool Firenze Bar at night, has a closet full of black clothes and is even the reluctant star of an underground film. By day she writes ad copy for her father's store and manages to keep the rest of the employees, her outspoken, ambitious aunt and her stylish but ineffectual uncle, on an even keel. The only thing that really keeps her interest is a mysterious book of poems that belonged to her dead mother.

Charlotte Gray by Sebastian Faulks [F/FAU]

It is 1942 and London is blacked out, but France is under a greater darkness as the occupying Nazi forces encroach even closer in a tense waiting game. Charlotte Gray, a volatile but determined young woman, travels south from Edinburgh. Working in London, she has a brief but intense love affair with an RAF pilot. When his plane is lost over France, she contrives to go there herself to work in the Resistance and to search for him.

Mermaid's Dream by Alane Fay [F/FAY]

Anthropology proffers Laly Lawrence and Sugar Stephens are modern, independent women. They're also certified deep-sea divers and they're in the middle of the Caribbean searching for ancient artifacts. Then, after an unexpected earthquake and storm, Laly braves the aftershocks and dives down for one last look and finds hidden treasure. Sugar plunges in after her and suddenly; both women are swept into a time slip.

My Timeswept Heart by Amy J. Fetzer [F/FET]

Street-smart, Olympic trained gymnast Tess Renfrew was caught between the devil and the deep blue sea. Pursued by a gang of hoods, forced to choose between a bullet and a water death, she leapt over the rail of a Bahama bound cruiser only to be swept into a thundering wall of mist. Carried to safety on the back of a dolphin, Tess awoke in the arms of a ravishingly handsome 18th century pirate.

Life Skills by Katie F. Fforde**[F/FFO]**

Suddenly out of work, Julia Farifax needs a new direction. The classified ad that catches her eye sends her on a delightful, hilarious adventure along the English canals on a rickety old hotel boat. Among the twists and turns, Julia encounters a passel of persnickety guests, an irritating ex-boyfriend, the challenges of cooking in a galley the size of a closet and a whole lot of rattling teacups. Add some frighteningly narrow bridges to steer through and you've got the makings of an unforgettable journey.

From Time to Time by Jack Finney**[F/FIN]**

Jack Finney returns to the same magical territory and finds Ruben Prien still at work with the Project, still dreaming of altering man's fate by going back in time to adjust events. Rube's purpose in summoning Si back from that earlier world is no less grand than an attempt to prevent World War I from erupting.

Ring of Fire by Eric Flint**[SiFi/FLI]**

The inhabitants of a modern day West Virginia town hurtled back in time to Germany during the Thirty Years War battle the tyrants of seventeenth century Europe in a collection of alternate history tales.

1634: The Galileo Affair by Eric Flint, Andrew Dennis**[SiFi/FLI]**

The Thirty Years War continues to ravage 17th century Europe, but a new force is gathering power and influence: the United States of Europe, forged by an alliance between Gustavus Adolphus, King of Sweden and the West Virginians from the 20th century led by Mike Stearns who were hurled centuries into the past by a mysterious cosmic accident.

The Christmas Mystery by Jostein Gaarder**[F/GAA]**

Joachim discovers a magic Advent calendar that contains the story of a little girl who traveled through time to be present at the birth of Jesus.

Dragonfly in Amber by Diana Gabaldon [CAS/F/GAB][F/GAB]

The author dazzled readers with a love story that spanned two centuries. Hailed by critics for its spellbinding blend of history, passion and drama, it is a unique evocation of 18th century Scotland from the perspective of a modern heroine.

Drums of Autumn by Diana Gabaldon [CAS/F/GAB][F/GAB]

Cast ashore in the American colonies, the Frasers are faced with a bleak choice: return to a Scotland fallen into famine and poverty, or seize the risky chance of a new life in the New World menaced by Claire's certain knowledge of the coming Revolution.

Voyager by Diana Gabaldon [CAS/F/GAB][F/GAB]

Claire faces a possibility both fearsome and exhilarating. Having returned to her own time, pregnant and brutalized by her trip through the standing stones, she makes a new life for herself, training to become a doctor and raising her daughter, Brianna.

The Fiery Cross by Diana Gabaldon [F/GAB]

The year is 1771 and war is coming. Jamie Fraser's wife tells him so. Little as he wishes to, he must believe it, for hers is a gift of dreadful prophecy. Claire Randall served England as a nurse on the battlefields of World War II and in the aftermath of peace found fresh conflicts when she walked through a cleft-stone on the Scottish Highlands and found herself an outlander, an English lady in a place where no lady should be.

The Rising Sun by Douglas Galbraith [F/GAL]

In 1698, five vessels led by the flagship Rising Sun embarked on a perilous voyage for the northern coast of what is now Panama, where the 2,000 passengers intended to establish a settlement at Darien. With them went the hopes and fortunes of the nation of Scotland, which sought to build an overseas colony so that it could at last compete on the world stage with its rival England. Only 300 would return alive.

Foreign Parts by Janice Galloway

This book is a funny, sharp and gutsy portrayal of female friendship and a painstakingly crafted multi-layered investigation of contemporary female experience.

Fallam's Secret by Denise Giardina

[F/GIA]

Following a strange note left to her by her late uncle, Lydde finds herself transported back to England in 1657, where the ruling Puritans have outlawed all forms of entertainment and where falls in love with a bandit named Raven.

Runaway Magic by Deborah Gordon

[F/GOR]

Luke Wyndham is not the one foretold. He is, after all, a detestable cad with murderous reputation and the most arrogant, infuriating lord ever to emerge from Victoria's England. But something in Luke's blazing green eyes stirs Sukey to her very soul.

Irish Gold by Andrew M. Greeley

[LP/M/GRE][M/GRE]

Dermot Michael Coyne's grandparents left Ireland during the Troubles and would never discuss their reasons. Dermot travels to Ireland to learn more about the O'Riadas and their sudden departure from the land they so loved. There he meets Nuala Anne McGrail, a student at Trinity College. Unfortunately for Dermot, success in his quest could get him and Nuala killed.

Sunsets by Robin Jones Gunn

[F/GUN]

Alissa loves her new job as a travel agent in Pasadena. Unfortunately, shortly after her arrival, an abrupt meeting with a man at her favorite espresso shop leaves her with the impression that all men in California are rude and there are no heroes left on the planet.

- A Fold in the Tent of the Sky** by Michael Hale [F/HAL]
Struggling actor Peter Abbott is about to land the biggest role of his life and of the future, past, and present of everyone around him. His audition for Calliope Associates requires only proof of his psychic skills, no dramatic monologue. When a government needs to know what weapons its enemies are hiding or the FBI needs to find an elusive criminal, they call Calliope, a clandestine private investigation firm made up of men and women with highly developed psychic abilities.
- Murder Walks the Plank** by Carolyn G. Hart [LP/M/HAR][M/HAR]
When Annie Darling, the popular proprietress of the Death on Demand bookstore, throws a cruise party with guests dressing up as their favorite fictional sleuths. It's a success until one of the revelers falls overboard.
- A Deadly Schedule** by Roy Hart [M/HAR]
At long last, Inspector Douglas Roper is able to get away from England to Greece for a much needed vacation. But his peaceful, idyllic holiday is interrupted when he discovers Mrs. Gribo, one of the guests at his hotel, brutally murdered in her ransacked room. Roper reluctantly returns to work in rainy Dorset where nothing appears to have changed in his absence.
- A Green Journey** by Jon Hassler [F/HAS]
As bracing as spring breezes after a season in the doldrums, Hassler's novel is set in the fictional midwestern town he made famous in his debut, Staggerford and in Ireland. This is a novel as warm, funny, tryst and surprising as its prized predecessors.
- Closely Akin to Murder** by Joan Hess [M/HES]
This book begins with a chilling phone call from a cousin thought dead for thirty years and a request that sends Claire off on what may be a wild goose chase or a hunt that makes her a sitting duck for a killer.

Strangers on a Train by Patricia Highsmith

In this book we encounter Guy Haines and Charles Anthony Bruno, passengers on the same train. But while Guy is a successful architect in the midst of a divorce, Bruno turns out to be a sadistic psychopath who manipulates Guy into swapping murders with him. As Bruno carries out his twisted plan, Guy is trapped in a perilous world, where, under the right circumstances, anybody is capable of murder.

Truly, Madly Viking by Sandra Hill

His boat off course, distracted by a randy she whale whose infatuation had somehow thrust him into the twenty first century, Jorund Ericsson had cause to question his surroundings. Though the befuddled Viking thought he'd found heaven when he caught sight of the comely wench with the man hair and the kiss some lips, the lovely doctor simply thought him crazy. Jorund realized the only thing that had driven him to the edge was her enticing figure.

The Very Virile Viking by Sandra Hill

In the Shadow of the Nile by Sara Hylton

When the British ocean liner departs Southampton, it seems much like the many other ships headed for the East in late 1922. On board are socialites bound for the winter season in Alexandria, Indian Army officers reporting to Bombay and a small disparate group continuing all the way to Cairo.

Timeswept Love by Cherlyn Jac

[F/JAC]

Tucson policewoman T.J. McAllister is determined to catch Jake Calder, the man responsible for her sister's death – even if it kills her. Tracking him up a cliff nearly does, especially when she tumbles off and lands in another century. Now, sprawled in the desert dust of 1880's Arizona, T.J. gazes up into the stunned blue eyes of sexy lawman Chance Burkette. Chance doesn't know who this bizarrely dressed woman is or why she wants to join him on his hunt for the notorious Calder gang.

The Wings of the Dove by Henry James

Le Divorce by Diane Johnson

This novel is about Americans in Paris or worse, Americans from Santa Barbara, California, in Paris. Also, French cultural superiority and American innocence. It's about one sister's marriage, another's illicit love, infidelity, and family disapproval. Was it a crime of passion or perhaps murder?

A Dangerous Friend by Ward Just

The author penetrates more deeply into America's role in the world than he has ever done before. Here is the story of conscience and its consequences among those for whom Vietnam was neither the right fight nor the wrong fight but the only fight. The exotic tropical surroundings, the coarsening and corrupting effects of a colonial regime, the visionary delusions of the American democratizes, all play their part.

The Prodigal Spy by Joseph Kanon [F/KAN]

What if the Communist witch hunts of the 1950's had actually uncovered a spy? The place is Washington in 1950. The trouble with history, Nick Kotlar's father tells him, is that you have to live through it before you know how it will come out. For Walter Kotlar, a high-level State Department official, the stakes couldn't be higher: an ambitious congressman has accused him of treason. One snowy night the chief witness against his father plunges to her death and his father flees leaving only an endless mystery and the stain of his defection. It would be better Nick is told, to think of him as dead.

Keeper of the Mill by Mary Anne Kelly

Claire Breslinsky Benedetto's life as a Queens's housewife and mother is very different from the one she had ten years earlier when she was part of the international art and modeling scene in Germany. But some friendships remain and Claire is looking forward to a visit from her friend Isolde. Then Isolde calls with amazing news – she is not coming and Claire must come to Europe instead because Isolde is about to marry Claire's old lover.

Up in the Air by Walter Kirn

A traveling management consultant, thirty-five-year-old Ryan Bingham spends his life on airplanes and in airports as he travels around the country, pursuing his goal to accumulate one million miles in his frequent flyer account.

Spring Collection by Judith Krantz

[F/KRA]

Everyone in the world of fashion has been waiting for months, impatient to learn the names of the three American unknowns who will be picked to go to Paris to star in the debut spring collection of brilliant, bad boy designer Marco Lombardi. No one is more anxious than Frankie Severino, twenty-seven-years old and second in command at the modeling agency owned by her best friend and former model Justine Loring. The lucky models will be given an unprecedented chance at fame and fortune and one of them will win a \$12 million contract to represent Lombardi's couture house.

Man With A Past by Jayne Ann Krentz

Twice A Hero by Susan Krinard [F/KRI]

Capturing all the humor and magic that the author's fans have come to expect, she weaves a thrilling tale of time travel, intrigue and romantic adventure.

My Heart Stood Still by Lynn Kurland [F/KUR]

In a bleak landlocked keep on the English moors, Iolanthe MacLeod dreams of the sea and of a darkly handsome man to rescue her. Centuries have passed and she feels she has waited in vain, until now. Thomas McKinnon is used to attaining impossible heights but when the chance to restore a 12th century castle comes his way, he takes hammer in hand and crosses the Atlantic expecting to find nothing more interesting inside his new home than cobwebs and weeds but he is in for a surprise.

The Very Thought of You by Lynn Kurland [F/KUR]

Alexander Smith had found success in the world of corporate takeovers but not happiness. That had always escaped him along with true love. Then, he found a pirate map that miraculously answered his yearnings with a journey to another time.

The Debt to Pleasure by John Lanchester [F/LAN]

This is a novel in which the impeccably correct Tarquin Winot relates the story of his life through that most basic and sublime of human passions: food.

Tiger's Tail by Gus Lee [CAS/F/LEE][F/LEE]

This book is a dazzling literary thriller that looks for truth in a kaleidoscope of disguised dangers. It's a departure from the author's previous stories and showcases the breadth of his story telling talents.

Forget Me Not by Shari Mac Donald [F/MAC]

Traveling to England's famed Newhaven estate to pursue an internship as a landscape architect, Hayley Buckman looked forward to making her long held career dreams come true. What she didn't anticipate was the awakening of her deepest longings.

Life of Pi by Yann Martel [CD/F/MAR][F/MAR]

Pi Patel, having spent an idyllic childhood in Pondicherry, India, as the son of a zookeeper, sets off with his family at the age of sixteen to start anew in Canada, but his life takes a marvelous turn when their ship sinks in the Pacific, leaving him adrift on a raft with a 450 pound Bengal tiger for company.

Cured by Fire by Tim McLaurin [F/MCL]

The author tells the story of Lewis Calhoon and Elbridge Snipes, two men who lead very different lives. Lewis is a building contractor with a comfortable home, a promising future; Elbridge, a migrant worker with an unshakable faith in God, has known only a hardscrabble existence. But they have these things in common: love of nature, respect for family and homelessness.

Debatable Land by Candia McWilliam [F/MCW]

This is a story of memory, childhood, desire and Scotland from where three of the ship's six crewmembers hail. On board the Ardent Spirit are the painter Alec Dundas, escaping a painful, failed marriage; Logan Urquhart, the boat's aggressive and restless owner-skipper; his troubled second wife Elspeth; Nick and Sandro, two marine nomads; and Gabriel, an attractive young woman who captivates the men.

Snow Wolf by Glenn Meade

[LP/F/MEA][F/MEA]

In January 1953 the Cold War is at its coldest. President Eisenhower is receiving increasingly alarming reports that Stalin's mental health is rapidly deteriorating. That he's about to recommence his horrifying purges and his thermonuclear bomb program is almost complete and likely to precipitate another world war. Beyond the Threshold by Linda Lael Miller

Elisabeth McCartney returned to her family home seeking comfort. But she never dreamed that the journey would help her escape from the present. Without warning, Elisabeth finds herself one hundred years in the past, in the home of Dr. Jonathan Fortner.

The Chocolate Ship by Marissa Monteilk [F/MON]

After three years together, Mia can't help wondering if she's got a real future with Miles. She is willing to put her doubts aside until after the vacation they've planned together with a group of their closest friends: a luxurious Caribbean cruise on the maiden voyage of the Chocolate Ship. En route to Paradise, anything can happen and anything goes. Wings are sprouted, taboos are tolerated, truths are revealed, hearts are broken and reassembled and lovin' is served up as hot as Caribbean spice. All of a sudden Miles has a new crew of admirers and Mia caught the roving eye of the very fine Delmonte Harrison himself.

Mutant Message Down Under by Marlo Morgan [LP/F/MOR][F/MOR]

This book is a fictional account of the spiritual odyssey of an American woman in Australia. Summoned by a remote tribe of nomadic Aborigines to accompany them on a walkabout through the Outback, she makes a four month long journey with the "Real People," as the tribe calls itself. During this time she learns how they live and thrive in natural harmony with the plants and animals that exist in the rugged geography of the desert region.

Time Lottery by Nancy Moser [F/MOS]

This is a memorable character novel that deals with the lifelong repercussions of good and bad choices. It leaves you feeling both thoughtful and thankful.

Stone Garden by Molly Moynahan [F/MOY]

Coming of age in the privileged sects of New Jersey prep schools, artistic Alice finds her world crashing around her when her best friend goes missing while on vacation in Mexico.

The Holder of the World by Bharati Mukherjee [F/MUK]

This is a story of Hannah Easton, born in the American colonies in 1670, "a person undreamed of in Puritan society." After traveling to Mughal India in the company of her husband, an English trader, Hannah sets her own course into the life and imagination of the country.

Turbulence by John J. Nance

Nance's latest high-speed drama begins with an airline in crisis because of poor customer service. The passengers on Meridian Flight Six have endured many hours of abusive treatment by rude and inept airline personnel and have been pushed to the breaking point. Here Abide Monsters by Andre Norton

Taking an abandoned road, two teenagers are transported back in time to Avalon of Arthurian legend where they are embroiled in a battle between good and evil.

Heaven on Earth by Constance O'Day-Flannery [F/ODA]
